Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Avalon MS serves 865 students enrolled in grades sixth through eighth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 36% Hispanic and 64% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 75% White, 11% Black, 1% Native, 9% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 4% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Jennifer Williams and Assistant Principals Michelle Anderson and Angie Algarin. Avalon MS is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Agriculture, PLTW, National Junior Honor Society, Orchestra, Band, Chorus, Musical Theatre, Battle of the Books Team, and various other electives and clubs.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Avalon MS indicates that the average age of the collection is 2009 and the number of books per student is 16. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Avalon MS does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Avalon Middle School students showed substantial growth in all state achievement data except for 7th and 8th grade ELA. Our 7th grade math data is lower because we only had 46 7th graders in regular 7th grade math.
- The average publication date of 2009 is above the district average, but can still be improved.
- The reading level of our students is higher than the average 5.4 reading level of our collection.
- Purchases of new books will focus on Hispanic students and Hispanic heritage.

• Weeding will focus on updating aged titles in the non-fiction section, as well as any books in the collection that do not meet statute requirements.

Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.

- Technology is dated. Need to weed and purchase to update the collection.
- Literature and Religion books are dated and need to be updated, even though we do not have many checkouts in that area.
- Computer Science, Information, & General Works were updated a few years ago, but since this area changes over the years, we can update this section as well.
- Overall focus needs to be on updating non-fiction collections and completing fiction series.

Priority 3: Purchase more books with higher Lexile levels to meet the needs of our student population.


Year-to-Year Collection Change
